Preparations are well advanced for the 22nd PALA and 3rd IALS conferences, to be held here in Birmingham from April 4 to 6 and 7 to 9 respectively.

Dan pops out with Eszter that evening, presumably to thank her for all her hard work with registration and her linguistic translation skills!

Me? Well we're leaving tomorrow so I'm in packed, and in bed, by 8:30. I start to read some of the notes from the talks. I can't keep my eyes open. I wonder what Birmingham's going to be like? Can't be as tiring as this, surely? The last, cruel, thought that pops into my head as sleep overtakes me is how I can best factor Mick Short into the inevitable sketch, song or poem that I'm going to be press-ganged into performing. Did I really want to be taken seriously for my work? Well, that seems strangely academic now!
