Encyclopedia of Language and Linguistics

Encyclopedia of Language and Linguistics (Elsevier 2006, Keith Brown, ed.)

The recently published 14-volume Encyclopedia of Language and Linguistics is a useful resource for all Stylisticians. The Encyclopedia has a large 'Text Analysis and Stylistics' section, edited by Catherine Emmott. This section contains over seventy articles by leading specialists, including most of the key members of PALA (e.g. Peter Verdonk, Ron Carter, Willie van Peer, Paul Simpson, Katie Wales, Peter Stockwell, and Michael Toolan, amongst many others) plus other well-known text analysts and narratologists.

A recent review in *Choice* describes this Encyclopedia as 'the definitive scholarly reference work in linguistics and language studies' and says that it 'cannot be surpassed for its depth, currency, interdisciplinary coverage, and sheer comprehensiveness in a field where such an achievement seems next to impossible'.

This encyclopedia is the largest in linguistics and hence most of these 'Text Analysis and Stylistics' articles are substantial articles (mainly 5,000 to 10,000 words in length). Topics covered include

Style and Stylistics, major sub-areas of stylistics (e.g. Cognitive Stylistics, Feminist Stylistics, Pedagogical Stylistics and corpus approaches), tools for text analysis (e.g. transitivity analysis, relevance theory, schema theory, and Rhetorical Structure Theory) and literary and non-literary genres (e.g. poetry, narrative, drama, news, political genres). In addition to this section, the encyclopedia contains articles on all key areas of Linguistics (Syntax, Semantics, Phonetics, etc.) and many areas of related interest. The sections on Applied Linguistics (edited by Margie Berns), Media and Language (edited by Susan McKay), Politics and Language (edited by Ruth Wodak), Pragmatics (edited by Jacob Mey), and Translation (edited by Kirsten Malmkjær) are also likely to be of particular interest to PALA members.

The Encyclopedia is technically a second edition, but because of developments in the field since the first edition appeared, it has been constructed as an almost entirely new work with new editors and new authors. In total, there are over 3,000 articles, amounting to over 7,500,000 words. This large reference work is being marketed primarily at libraries and is available in both print and electronic versions. The price of the print version is \$5600, 4640 Euros, £3200 or (www.books.elsevier.com/ELL2)). The version electronic is available via ScienceDirect and contains additional multi-media files, such as sound files, images and videos. Huddersfield University have just launched a new MA in Modern English Language. Popularity of corpus stylistics increases



Linguists gather at IVACS conference in Nottingham

Sunday June 25, 2006

About 120 linguists gathered in the Portland Building on University Park Campus on June 23 and 24 to exchange ideas on "Language at the Interface". The event was hosted by the Centre for Research in Applied Linguistics at the University of Nottingham. At the 3rd IVACS conference, delegates from all over the world worked relentlessly in up to five parallel sessions to search for new linguistic facts. PALA treasurer Peter Stockwell and PALA publicity officer Martin Wynne also joined the discussions. In their joint keynote address, the Nottingham Professor and the Head of the Oxford Text Archive initiated a public inquiry into the recently discovered phenomenon 'corpus stylistics'. Svenja Adolphs,

spokesperson for the organising committee, said 'stylistics is very much a Nottingham thing, so in our programme we were keen to include something on corpus stylistics'. The event happened a month before corpus approaches to literature will also be a topic at this year's PALA conference. LIAR!

A report on the 1st International Conference on Linguistic Impoliteness And Rudeness (LIAR): Confrontation and Conflict in Discourse.

75 Delegates from 28 Countries over 2 Days in 1 Location.

On 3-4 July 2006 the University of Huddersfield, in association with Lancaster University, played host to the first international conference dedicated entirely to the concepts of Linguistic Impoliteness and Rudeness. This two-day conference helped to foster research on this vastly under-represented area. Whilst all papers contributed in some wav to understanding of this particular area of language usage, the conference brought together a range of theoretical and methodological approaches exploring the notion of impoliteness and the usage of impoliteness phenomena in a variety of different discourses. Researchers and postgraduates from across Europe, Asia, Australasia, North and South America and Africa who are working in a multitude of associated and complementary fields attended and presented. The conference also helped to extend the field of politeness studies, which, hitherto, has paid little attention to impoliteness.

This conference, jointly organised by Derek Bousfield and Jonathan Culpeper, was the third in a series backed by the Linguistic Politeness Research Group. The conference also ties in with a special edition of the Journal of Politeness Research on impoliteness which will be published in July 2008. The format of the conference encompassed the presentation of posters and papers, some of which were plenary. The keynote plenary presentations were given by Professor Richard J. Watts (University of Bern,

Switzerland) and Professor Janet Holmes (Victoria Wellington University, New Zealand). The Plenary Panel Presentations were given by Professor Timothy Jay (Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts, USA), Kristen Jaschewitz (University of California), Professor Lynne Andersson (Temple University, USA) and Dr Helen Spencer-Oatey (University of Cambridge, UK).

Call for Papers

International Interdisciplinary Conference

Literature, Culture, and Tolerance (Lodz, 28 – 30th of May, 2007)

Tolerance is a cultural value often associated with such phenomena as humanism, pacifism or acceptance of human variety and diversity. Such an association has, undoubtedly, historical and geographical determinations but, according to some contemporary thinkers, this particular relationship between toleration and other values might have essential, evolutionary dimension. Is there any decisive correlation between literature as a medium of culture and tolerance? We would like to discuss many other questions with a multidisciplinary group of scholars of literature, culture, and philosophy. We are particularly enthusiastic about issues such as:

- historical representations of tolerance and intolerance in culture and literature;
- literature and culture as a crucial test for authenticity of values;
- literary and quasi-literary justification of toleration and/or fanaticism:
- a role of literary and quasi-literary conventions (genres) in shaping culture of tolerance (e. g. satire, caricature etc.)
- relationship between toleration and freedom of satire and raillery;
- relationship between toleration and liberty; tolerance and individualism, tolerance and politeness; tolerance and culture; toleration and dissidents in religion and society.

This list is a proposal and is not exhaustive.

Sharon Achinstein (St. Edmund Hall, Oxford UK), Dame Gillian Beer (Clare Hall, Cambridge UK), Wlodzimierz Bolecki (Institute of Literary Research, the Polish Academy of Science, Warsaw), Arne Melberg (Oslo University), Charles Russell (Associate Director of the Rutgers Institute on Ethnicity, Culture, and the Modern Experience at Rutgers University, USA), Magdalena Sroda (University of Warsaw), Janusz Tazbir (Institute of History, Polish Academy of Science. Warsaw)

There is also the Honorary Organizing Committee including:

Prof. Leszek Kolakowski (All Souls College, Oxford), *Dr Marek Edelman* and President of the Institute of Tolerance in Lodz, *Joanna Podolska*.

Language of the conference is English and Polish.

A book of papers from the conference will be in Polish (all English contribution will be translated).

31st of October 2006 – declaration of interest in the conference 31st of January 2007 deadline for submitting a brief information on the content of a 20-min. presentations (the registration form reaches the organisers) 10th of February 2007 – confirmation of acceptance of proposals 31st of March 2007 – deadline for submitting abstracts of 20 minutes presentations (in English, up to 500 words)
