




GET IN TOUCH


INTRODUCTION

The Chair welcomes members, thanks everyone who has taken part in the conference and is now joining the AGM.





Based on the results of the survey, the Committee suggests the following two additions to the Conference Organisation Guidelines that can be found on the PALA website:

- Can I offer accessibility provisions to members of the PALA community who may need additional assistance to attend the conference or summer school?
- Do I have the ability and support to offer some or all of the conference in an online space, allowing attendees the ability to participate remotely?

This is because PALA is committed to inclusivity and offering a safe space for all its members, and the annual conference is certainly the one moment in the life of the Association when this is especially evident. With regard to online spaces in conference organising, the addition is not meant to suggest that hybrid components be compulsory from now on; rather, it is an aspect that the Committee wishes for prospective conference organisers to consider when putting a bid together.

By the same token, a change is suggested to the form for activity funding:

• Please give an overview of the activity you are planning. This may include the type of activity (seminars, symposia, research, teaching, outreach), the intended audience, and the intended outcomes. Please also provide an expected timeline for the activity.

This is because there are many activities other than seminars and symposia – which will keep being funded when they meet the criteria of being stylistics-centred and being organised by (a) PALA member(s) – that can be funded and that can have a positive impact on the Association as a whole, e.g. podcasts, someone who gets funded to buy the license for a software who then not only produces a publication using that software but also agrees to host a one-hour online workshop for students, and so on.

The membership agrees on the suggested additions.

The Chair then invites Andrea Macrae to present the PALA podcast, which was proposed to the committee last year for sponsorship for a pilot of c.10 episodes.

The podcast is intended to share the research of PALA scholars in an accessible and engaging way; to help publicise what research in poetics, stylistics, language and linguistics can involve, and why it matters; to give a platform, in particular, to early career academics; and also to provide an opportunity for the sharing of methodological challenges. The sponsorship covers the small cost of the podcasting platform subscription and a £50 e-voucher per episode for the interviewee(s) (to be shared between interviewees if there is more than one). The intended audience is mainly academics and students but also those with a general interest in these fields and the wider public.

The first series focusses on intersections between poetics, stylistics, language and linguistics research and sustainability (in its broader sense). Two episodes are published, three more are agreed and a further five will follow.

ndrea is seeking to pass the podcast on to others for series two (though will continue to provide support e.g., editing if needed) and plans solicit expressions of interest to include a vision of the podcast and an outline of relevant experience (full details to be confirmed). Two ECAs have expressed initial interest. The podcast is available on all standard podcasting platforms, though directory listing (to be 'searchable') is still pending for a few (e.g., Podbean and Google Play). The PALA members present are invited to download, listen, subscribe, publicise, and 'like' it, and to use it in their teaching, and generally enjoy it.

The Chair hands the floor over to the members of the PALA Committee for their reports.

A. REPORTS & UPDATES

1. Secretary (Elisabetta Zurru)

The Secretary reminds members that since the Secretary (currently, Elisabetta Zurru) and the Publicity Officer (currently, M'Balia Thomas) were elected in November 2020, elections will take place for these posts in October 2023. Elisabetta Zurru and M'Balia Thomas can be both nominated for a second term. In addition, since Suzanne McClure had to step down at the end of May 2023 and Naomi Adam, who works with Suzanne, has kindly accepted to work as interim Newsletter Editor in order for the role not to be vacant during the annual Conference, the Newsletter Editor position will also be open for election in October 2023. If elections are necessary, they will take place through the use of a secure, online form. Elisabetta reminds everyone that nominees, nominators and seconders must all be fully paid-up PALA members and that she will email the membership with detailed instructions in the Autumn, when the election process starts.

Elisabetta also informs members that Suzanne received a gift card as a gift for her role as Newsletter Editor, while a donation to RSPCA (an animal charity) was made as a gift for the PALA 2023 Conference Organisers, as per their request. Finally, Elisabetta points out that the last printed flyers are available on the publishers' desk for all members to take home and use to publicise the Association. These are the last printed flyers that will be available, as the Committee has agreed to go completely digital, for both ecological and economic reasons, when it comes to publicity materials.

2. Treasurer (Martine van Driel)

Since the Treasurer could not attend the conference, the Chair reads her report, starting from sharing information about the PALA account.

Money was spent to: reimburse the founding members of PALA who participated in PALA 2022 conference in France; sponsor stylistic-related events; fund bursaries for the annual conference; buy gifts for former Committee members. All the bursaries have been paid digitally because Martine was not going to be in Bertinoro. The Student Representative has been tasked with handing the last two bursaries to Ukrainian students during the conference, because they cannot receive bank transfers at the moment. Finally, a 50 pounds gift card was funded as a prize for the winning team of 'The Big Fat PALA Student Pub Quiz' which took place during the conference in Bertinoro and was organized by the Student Representative.

3. Student Representative (Polina Gavin)

The Student Representative updates the membership about:

• Student Memberships

Student memberships are up to date, 587 PGR members are subscribed to PALA Announce.

• PALA Students @ PALA Space

An official Instagram account of the PGR community @pala.space advertises the upcoming PALA conference and other discipline-related events. The account is picking up followers (88 followers, May – July 2023).

Pre-conference PGR & ECR promotional campaign

A promotional campaign advertising the upcoming PGR & ECR talks on social media received very positive responses. 20 talks were publicised on social media throughout the 6 weeks before the conference.

PALA Student Meet & Greet

Together with Naomi Adam and Paula Ghintuiala, Polina has organised 'The Big Fat PALA Student Pub Quiz' on the 13th of July, 7-9pm, to offer PALA students a chance to meet at the beginning of the conference.

4. Membership Secretary (Marcello Giovanelli)

The Membership Secretary updates the membership about:

• Current membership numbers

Full Members: 199; 113 paying by auto-renewal (2022 AGM: 192; 111): Journal subscription: 90; 51 (2022: 84; 54); Non-Journal subscription: 109; 62 (2022: 108; 57).

Membership renewals

PALA membership is for the calendar year and Marcello has again encouraged all members to renew in January 2023 regardless of their 2022 membership starting point. Any membership that was taken out in October-December 2022, however, was extended to start 1st January 2023. It would be really helpful if everyone could renew in January 2024 for 2024. Marcello suggests that members who have a membership which comes out at a different time of the year cancel that and start a new one in January 2024. This would help with sending the list of journal subscribers to Sage by the deadline, even though Sage seems to be asking for a member list much earlier than usual (they wanted it in December in 2022!), which clearly does not work for us.

• Membership database

Following the update last summer, this is now up to date. Members who have not renewed this year and who do not have an auto-renew set up have been removed.

At the end of the Membership Secretary's report, Marcello is asked how members can proceed if they do not remember whether they renewed they membership, and Marcello says they can email him and he will check their membership status; he is asked whether it could be a possibility to anticipate the deadline to join the Association, considering Sage's request for an earlier list, and Marcello replies that he managed to keep the end of January deadline for now, but that this might need to be reconsidered in the future based on Sage's stance on the matter; he is asked if someone can be considered a member for the following year (e. g. 2024) if they enroll later in the previous year (e.g. November-December 2023), and Marcello replies that that is what has happened so far (for example, any membership that was taken out in October-December 2022 was extended to start 1st January 2023), but he underlines that it would be really helpful if members could join in January each year.

5. Publicity Officer (M'Balia Thomas)

Since the Publicity Officer could not attend the conference, the Secretary reads her report:

- PALA Social Media
- Twitter: @PoeticsLinguist. 1.579 followers (June 2023). Continues an upward trend: 1.484 followers (June 2022); 1.292 followers (June 2021); 879 Twitter followers (June 2019); 586 in (June 2018). Twitter membership seems to be growing steady, even with the change in Twitter ownership.
- Facebook: https://www.facebook.com/PoeticsandLinguisticsAssociation. 2.6K likes, 2.7 followers (June 2023). Continues an upwards trend: 2.285 people "like" PALA; 2.344 people follow PALA (June 2022); 1.976 people "like" PALA; 2.022 people follow PALA (June 2021); 1.727 followers (June 2019) and 1.632 followers (June 2018).

PALA Ambassadors

- Who They Are. Presently, there are 23 Ambassadors from countries and regions around the globe. Their names and email addresses are posted on the PALA website. There are several countries/regions not represented—for example, we do not currently have any UK Ambassadors. Since these commitments run on an annual basis, the Publicity Officer will send out a recruitment email in January.
- What They Do. PALA Ambassadors encourage communication and interaction between PALA members on a local and/or regional level. They also facilitate the development of local PALA networks, from simply serving as a first contact point for news and events of PALA interest within a particular region, to organizing small-scale events (symposia, conferences, or social get-togethers). PALA student members are especially welcome to get involved.
- Virtual Gatherings. Last year M'Balia held virtual gatherings with the Ambassadors. They were a great opportunity to hear what kinds of activities were taking place, or Ambassadors desired to take place, in their region. M'Balia has not been able to hold virtual gatherings this year due to her work schedule. The hope is that these virtual gatherings will resume in the coming year.
- PALA Announce
- What We Send. Information about events (conferences, symposiums, workshops, talks) and calls for proposals of potential interest to PALA members (goes out via Announce, FB, Twitter); as well as PhD and Job opportunities (Announce only).
- Publicity Materials
- •The Publicity Officer can provide electronic PALA logo, banner, and flyers for PALA-funded events and activities.

At the end of the Publicity Officer's report, a question is asked about the possibility of Ambassadors not being active and how the Committee proceeds in that case. Elisabetta, based on her experience as former Publicity Officer and on her working alongside M'Balia on Committee business all year round, replies by stating that the Committee is extremely thankful to anyone who invests their time to act as PALA Ambassador in their region and understands that there might be moments during the academic year when Ambassadors cannot be as active, as they have other pressing academic commitments; however, if the inactivity lasts for a considerable amount of time and there are no replies to the Publicity Officer's check-ins, the Committee considers them as no longer active in their role of PALA Ambassador.

6. Newsletter Editor (Naomi Adam)

The interim Newsletter Editor will email the membership in the Autumn to encourage members to write pieces and share information that can be published in the next issue of Parlance at the end of the year.

7. Webmaster (Kimberley Pager-McClymont)

Since the Webmaster could not attend the conference, the Chair reads her report:

• Site general maintenance:

The PALA website fully up to date. Members can email the Webster if they have forgotten the password to access members-only pages.

- All Parlance issues are online.
- Proceedings from PALA 2022:

All proceedings are now online, including a special piece from Mick Short and Katie Wales.

8. Editor of Language and Literature (Dan McIntyre)

Since the Editor of *Language and Literature* could not attend the conference, Rocío Montoro, one *Language and Literature*'s Assistant Editors, reads his report:

The Editor of Language and Literature wishes to thank the members of the editorial team, the many people who review for the journal, and of course everyone who send their work. It is becoming more difficult to find reviewers, so Dan is very grateful to those who give up their time to review for Language and Literature, especially given the difficult circumstances that many people are working in. In terms of Impact Factor, Dan is pleased to be able to report that Language and Literature has maintained its Impact Factor of 0.7 from the last few years. There have been two significant changes to Journal Citation Reports (JCR) this year: 1) the format of the Impact Factor has changed from three decimal places (#.###) to one decimal placs (#.#), which simplifies the Impact Factor score but also results in more ties between journals; 2) the 2022 Impact Factor is the first one calculated entirely based on the electronic publication date of articles, ending a multi-year transition away from issue publication dates. The editorial team could do more to try and game this system, for example by publishing more of the kind of work that is highly cited - review articles, special issues, etc. However, they are reluctant to do too much of this, because the key factor in whether something gets published or not ought to be its intrinsic quality and worth. The Impact Factor we currently have is respectable and Dan and the rest of the editorial team will aim to ensure that it does not decrease, while keeping to their principle of academic quality being the primary criterion for publishing.

B. AWARDS & BURSARIES

9. The PALA Prize 2023

This prize is for the best paper published in *Language and Literature* by an early career academic in the preceding year. *Language and Literature's* editorial team looked at articles published in 2022. They do not consider jointly published papers where one or more of the contributing authors is an established academic. The decision was made by the editor and assistant editors. None of them had any links with any of the candidates and so there was no need for anyone to recuse themselves from the judging process.

Their unanimous decision was that the PALA Prize for best article published in *Language and Literature* by an early career academic in 2022 is awarded to Kimberley Pager-McClymont (University of Aberdeen) for her article Linking Emotions to Surroundings: A Stylistic Model of Pathetic Fallacy, published in Volume 31, Issue 3. The prize consists of a subscription to the journal, membership of PALA for one year, and £250 cash from Sage.

10. The Palgrave Prize 2023

The Palgrave Prize is awarded for the best written version of a presentation delivered by a student member at the annual conference the previous year. The PALA Committee awards this prize. This year, two members of the PALA Committee have read the published versions of papers presented by students at PALA 2022 and have agreed that the winner of the Palgrave Prize based on proceedings from last year's conference is Ella Wydrzynska, with a paper entitled 'That's great, Mr Narrator': Exploring metalepsis in the works of Tom Fletcher. The Palgrave Prize consists of a choice of books up to the value of £150 from all titles in the Language and Linguistics section of Palgrave's website.

C. LOOKING FORWARD

PALA 2025

Marcello Giovanelli, on behalf of the Aston Stylistics Research Group, based at Aston University, Birmingham (UK), formally express their desire to host the PALA conference in July 2025. They are all active researchers in stylistics, linguistics and English literature with interests spanning cognitive poetics, empirical literary studies, contemporary fiction, poetry, educational linguistics, Shakespeare, corpus linguistics/stylistics, and multimodality. The Aston Stylistics Research Group has established a reputation for running events such as their annual international Applied Stylistics Symposium (now in its third year) and their research seminar series. Both have attracted leading international stylisticians. They are also experienced in holding hybrid events and have the necessary infrastructure at Aston to commit to having some hybrid aspect. Should the membership accept their bid, they are prepared to give a detailed presentation of the PALA 2025 conference and summer school in Aston after the closing ceremony of the PALA 2024 Conference at Sheffield Hallam University.

The membership accepts the bid.




THE BIG FAT

I'd heard the odd mention or two of PALA through my Literary Linguistics MA, but it took to the start of my PhD to seriously consider attending a PALA conference. Little did I know that it would be the highlight of the first year of my PhD.

In December 2022, I was just a few months into my PhD researching representations of fictional consciousness. I felt I'd only just got started when the call for papers for PALA 2023 came through. But, after some gentle encouragement / prompting / cajoling, I decided to submit an abstract with the hopes (and slight trepidation) of having it accepted and the opportunity to attend my first PALA conference.

Fast forward to July 2023 and I was on my way to Bologna for my first PALA conference.



After a fairly smooth journey – with time to peruse the Heathrow airport's meal deal options (not too shabby), an only half-an-hour-delayed flight (I felt I'd hit the jackpot with such a small delay given previous "post-pandemic" travel experiences), a very cramped and sweaty squish on the Marconi Express (I thought it was full, then four more people got in), and an even sweatier walk to my hotel (nothing could have quite prepared me for the heat last summer) – I was in Bologna. The next day I'd be heading to the conference for five days of stylistics and general linguistic nerd-ing out in Bertinoro. Bliss.

The journey to the conference was slightly more chaotic due to a delayed train and late-arriving bus. However, I was in good company with a group of fellow late-arriving PALA goers and we were soon all rushing up the picturesque (but very steep) cobbled streets of Bertinoro and sneaking in rather tardily for the first PALA sessions.

I was due to present my own paper – "There are all sorts of lives": Internal dialogicity within first-person narration in Jean Rhys's Voyage in the Dark' exploring how individual consciousness is not isolated but shaped and constructed through interaction with the ideological viewpoints of others – the next morning and I was very much looking forward to leaving that fluttery butterfly feeling of nerves with the end of my presentation. A fluttery butterfly feeling somewhat amplified by the thoughts of having to present alongside all the brilliant presentations I'd seen so far...


Yet, when it came to it, it couldn't have been a more encouraging and fulfilling experience. I was touched by how many people braved the, by the time of my presentation, very warm room and afterwards told me how much they'd enjoyed my presentation. I was also delighted by all the discussions, questions, and suggestions that came subsequently, inspiring developments of my work. I'm always surprised by how a seemingly simple question or throwaway comment can sometimes be just the spark you need for your next idea.

The rest of the conference passed very quickly – fab panels, interesting chats, The Big Fat PALA Student Pub Quiz, good food (shoutout to the gelato shop), and even theatrics, comedy and opera, which I'm told is classic PALA post-conference dinner entertainment. All too soon it was the close of PALA 2023 and time to leave Bertinoro.

Starting my PhD in the aftermath of the Covid pandemic came with its challenges. While virtual meetings and socials allow for so much more flexibility, they do have their downsides ("You're on mute... You're on mute!", "Can everyone see my slides? ...Anyone?", "Sorry you broke up there for a second.") and I hadn't realised quite just how much I missed in-person events and those slightly more natural chats. So, it turns out PALA was exactly what I needed.



THE INSPIRATION BEHIND MY ARTICLE

The paper I wrote for *Language and Literature* entitled "Linking Emotions to Surroundings: A Stylistic Model of Pathetic Fallacy" is mostly inspired by my doctoral research. I used to be a secondary English teacher, and was asked to teach concepts such as pathetic fallacy or personification present in the literary texts under examination. I found it particularly challenging to teach students about pathetic fallacy because different sources from the English Curriculum to exam boards (such as AQA or Edexcel) each had different ideas of what the concept was and my colleagues also found it frustrating.

To remedy this, I enrolled to do my doctoral research to develop a stylistically rooted model of pathetic fallacy. The richness of the data and the variety of examples allowed me to test my model extensively, and I am still developing this model today, finding more effects and new aspects of this complex and aesthetic metaphor. I have provided teaching and learning workshops for secondary educators and have received positive feedback for their uses for students, which makes this research all the more worthwhile for me.



Let's face it, it can be pretty daunting going to conferences as a student. Regardless of how much you mentally prepare in advance, leaving your safety net behind, travelling to some far-flung (albeit usually exciting!) destination and trying to make conversation with the big-name academics you've been citing in your thesis is quite scary when you think about it. And that's before you stand up in front of a room of those same big-name academics and attempt to share your research in a way that appears coherent, valuable and like you're not about to crumble beneath the pressure of imposter syndrome.



I guess that's what makes PALA such a unique experience. Within minutes of arriving at your first conference, you're welcomed with open arms and quickly realise that it's essentially one big family of equally idiosyncratic Stylisticians who are there to catch up with each other as friends and colleagues as much as to share their developing ideas about the field. I've been lucky enough to attend several conferences as a PhD student over the last few years and can easily say that PALA is the most welcoming, friendly, supportive and humour-filled of the bunch.

It's worth noting that 'supportive' is the key word in the previous sentence. Having just finished my PhD, I can reflect on my years spent as a student member of PALA and recognise how this community goes above and beyond to support its newer, up and coming colleagues. Free student membership to the society and a bursary that alleviates some of the financial burdens of attending the annual conference go a long way to inviting newer Stylisticians into the fold, but that's just the tip of the proverbial iceberg compared to the kindness offered towards student researchers themselves.



Speaking from personal experience, the insightful comments, thought-provoking and 'pinch me'-inducing praise that I've received when presenting at PALA conferences have not only developed my thesis for the better, but have shaped me into the researcher I am today.

I'm slightly embarrassed to admit that I spent a significant portion of my PhD being adamant that a long-term career in academia wasn't for me; the atmosphere, ethos and people at PALA played a huge part in changing my mind and I hope that, as I continue my career trajectory, I can influence and support student members in the same way the PALA community have influenced and supported me.

PALA 2023 in the beautiful – if boiling-hot – Bertinoro solidified this even more. Maybe it's because we were all in such close proximity for the duration of the conference rather than being spread across a wider city as in previous years (or across the entire globe if we think back to Nottingham's digital conference in 2021!), but the community element of PALA shone through like never before. It was such a joy to sit next to a stranger for the keynote talk in the morning and know that, by the end of the day, you'd be eating pasta together beneath a glorious sunset and chatting as if you'd known each other for years. Then, comfortably full of delicious carbohydrates, you'd huff-and-puff your way back up the cobblestoned hill to the conference centre, secure in the knowledge that you'd made yet another friend within this wonderful community.

In my narrating present, I just paused and read through what I'd written so far. While perhaps slightly more saccharine than my usual sarcastic and cynical demeanour would suggest, the sentiment expressed here is genuinely the first thing that came to mind when asked to reflect on PALA 2023.

And that's before I even reach the moment I found out I'd won the Palgrave Prize.

Words can't even begin to capture the immense privilege of having my research recognised in this way – or the simultaneous excitement and agonising deliberation that went into picking the texts I spent the prize money on (seriously, I think I may have set a record in how long it took to make a final decision). The truth of the matter is, however, that I still can't really believe it was my paper that won. Not because I'm trying to be charmingly self-deprecating (I'm really not), but because the true privilege of PALA comes from attending so many other student-led talks that are equally deserving of such recognition. I do not envy the decision-makers after this year's conference as there were countless fascinating, insightful and high-quality papers presented by student members of the society. That's testament to the skilful researchers currently working in the field of Stylistics but, more importantly, to the welcoming and supportive atmosphere built into PALA itself.







Because, ultimately, that's what makes this community so special. Yes, the research is important. Yes, we're there to network and share ideas and develop professionally. But the fun, the humour, the kindness and encouragement cannot – and should not – be overstated. Whether you've been part of PALA for decades or days, we're all equally valued. So make the most of it. Welcome to the family.

PALA PODCAST

EXPRESSION OF INTEREST

Following the success of the 2023 PALA Conference "Green Stylistics: Exploring Connections between Stylistics and the Environment" in Bertinoro (Italy) and the interest expressed by publishers on the conference theme, the organisers are now seeking expressions of interest from participants to the conference who are willing to submit a chapter for an edited volume, which we plan to submit by mid/end of 2024.

We are encouraging proposals based on the papers presented at the conference and strictly related to its topic concerning the relationship between style and the environment. The edited book aims at understanding how challenges related to the environmental crisis are stylistically represented in literature, communication, education and in the media. We are therefore seeking chapters that explore the relationship between style and the environment in a wide range of historical, geographical and cultural contexts, across different text types and genres, as well as from multimodal and interdisciplinary perspectives, including stylistics, pragmatics, semantics, narratology, literary studies, cultural studies, language teaching and translation.

As we are in the process of approaching suitable high-end publishers, we are inviting abstract proposals of 500-700 words, thus giving authors the opportunity to expand on their original conference abstract. The proposal should provide a summary of its content containing:

- a) title and (if applicable) subtitle
- b) a recognisable thesis/statement or research question. Explain how this is relevant to the above-mentioned field of study
- c) an explanation of the methodology
- d) some reference to your case-studies (if applicable)
- e) some reference to the purpose of your work.

If applicable mention results

- f) 3-5 keywords
- g) Up to 5 references

Along with your abstract you should also include your full name, affiliation/job title, contact address and a short bio (100 words max.)

Author guidelines for full chapters will be provided in due course.

What is your current job role?

I am working as a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at the Initiative for the Digital Economy at Exeter (INDEX; exeterindex.org), based at the University of Exeter. Presently, I am part of the Defence Data Research Centre (DDRC; ddrc.uk) team. This job came about by interviewing for a postdoc position in the Digital Media and Society Institute at University of Liverpool where I earned my PhD (Oppositional language as thematic signals in the novels of D.H. Lawrence; primary supervisor Professor Paul Simpson; secondary supervisor Dr. Victorina Gonzalez-Diaz). One of the interviewing panel on that day was Professor Zena Wood, co-director of DDRC. There were no open positions at Exeter but Dr. Wood offered a temporary contract until a postdoctoral position became available.



How do you apply your research expertise in this position?


The DDRC is funded by the Ministry of Defence (MoD) and we work directly with the Defence Science and Technology Laboratory (DSTL), the MoD's research arm. The team at DDRC is multidisciplinary with a diverse range of specialisations, spanning computer science, political science, digital humanities, computational mechanics, and cyber security. As my PhD utilised computational linguistic software and I hold an MBA in Information Systems, Professor Wood believed my academic and professional experiences would be a welcome addition to the INDEX team. During a recent meeting, a Senior Principal Scientist at DSTL asked if there were any DDRC team members with a linguistic background. I was delighted to respond that my MA and PhD were from the English Department at Liverpool.

What does your job involve?

I have spent the past year travelling England and Wales conducting Lego Serious Play workshops; don't laugh - it is a valid research methodology as an alternative to focus groups, interviews and surveys. We are looking at 'attitudes towards data' across various UK sectors, including local governments, profits, and small/medium enterprises (SMEs). I have worked on the design of a national UK survey of 5,000 people that examine the public's attitude towards technology and artificial intelligence.

And what do the next few months hold for you?

Our research findings will be analysed with various text analysis software including QDA Miner and NVivo. Next year, I will begin working on a DDRC healthcare project. I doubt it will involve Lego, but I am sure it will offer interesting challenges and insights!






